SFY 2015-16 EXECUTIVE BUDGET PROPOSAL Higher Education Summary Snapshot

SUNY STATE-OPERATED HOSPITALS AND HEALTH SCIENCES CENTERS

Our fight to save jobs and vital health care services at SUNY Downstate Medical Center and SUNY's other public hospitals and health sciences centers continues.

UUP fully expected the governor, in his so-called "Opportunity Agenda," to again attempt to shortchange Downstate and continue his quest to privatize it. These new threats are similar to those we've seen over the past several years.

As in the past, the governor is proposing a significant cut to the hospitals' state subsidy. He is again attempting to win passage of revised Article VII language that would create a pilot program to allow corporations to own and operate up to five state-run health care facilities. One of the private companies must link with an academic medical center or teaching hospital. Given the state's continued attempts to privatize, downsize and close Downstate, it's more than likely that Downstate would be that facility.

Our work is cut out for us, sisters and brothers. It is obvious that the governor would like nothing better than to remove health care from SUNY's oversight and privatize the state's public hospitals and health sciences centers.

We must not be silent. We must stand up and join once again with our community coalition, the SUNY Downstate Coalition of Faith, Labor and Community Leaders, to thwart these threats through rallies and strong advocacy efforts in Albany and Brooklyn.

Here are the challenges that we face:

State subsidy

The Executive Budget proposes a \$19 million decrease in the state hospitals' subsidy—a 21 percent reduction—to \$69 million. The subsidy has been on the chopping block each year since 2010, where the subsidy was \$128 million. The subsidy is \$88 million in the 2014-15 Enacted Budget.

Restructuring Health Care Delivery Systems Pilot Program

The Executive Budget again includes Article VII language that would create a pilot program for private companies to invest in, own and operate up to five state-run health care facilities. These can be hospitals, certified home health agencies, licensed home health agencies, and hospices.

With strong support from the SUNY Downstate coalition, we were able to convince the Legislature to reject the proposal in the 2014-15 Enacted budget. However, the revised legislation includes a number of challenges that may prove difficult to overcome. These "safeguard" provisions address concerns about the impact private investment could have on hospital employees, patients and community interests, and quality and access to care—including if the corporation tries to negotiate with a subsequent investor.

The proposed legislation would require a written evaluation of the pilot programs no later than three years after a business corporation affiliates with a state health care facility.

Hospital capital funding

The Executive Budget provides \$1.4 billion in new capital investments for infrastructure improvements and to stabilize health care providers to advance health care transformation goals. This investment includes

- \$700 million to stabilize the Kings County health care delivery system. The funds may be used to renovate or replace inefficient or outdated facilities as part of a merger, consolidation, acquisition or other significant corporate restructuring activity. Several media outlets have reported that the Cuomo administration is considering using the \$700 million for the construction of a new Brooklyn hospital.
- \$300 million for health care in Oneida County. The funds may be used to consolidate licensed health care facilities into an integrated system of acute inpatient, outpatient primary and other health care services.
- \$400 million for grants to essential health care providers to support debt retirement and capital projects or non-capital projects. The grants must be used to facilitate health care transformation, including mergers, consolidation, acquisition or other significant corporate restructuring activities intended to create a financially sustainable system of care that promotes a patient-centered model of health care delivery.

The Executive Budget proposal allows for funding to be awarded without a competitive bid or request for proposal process.

CONGRATULATIONS PD WINNERS

In advance, I would like to congratulate all our members who will be awarded Professional Development grants for their projects and activities.

The awards are determined by a campus Joint Labor Management Committee on Professional Development whose members are appointed in equal numbers by UUP and the administration.

Funding for the awards program was negotiated by UUP and is part of the 2011-16 Agreement between UUP and the State of New York. **The list of the recipients of the awards will be available the week of March 2 and will be posted on the UUP bulletin boards throughout the campus.**
